

Erasmus + Project *i*Go Eco 6th – 12th February 2022





A day in Florence: the city is worth rather more, but you can at least get some idea of it. With only that amount of time at your disposal, you will want to see the chief monuments and walk around the "heart" of the city centre.

Moreover: there's a crime to be solved while you're here! A murder has been committed, and it is your duty to find out who did it, when it was done and where. The good news is: you can find the solution by just easily strolling through this city while having a good look at the most famous and important sites of this city.

In this booklet on page 6 you can find a map of that city centre; several eyecatchers are indicated on it.

Split up in groups and visit some of them at random order. They're all outdoors, as we have no time to visit any monument or other building indoors. **Mind: you should visit these numbers:**

1: Piazza del Duomo with the Duomo and the tower.

2. The Battistero

3: the San Lorenzo Church

9: the Piazza della Signoria with the Palazzo Vecchio, the Fontana di Piazza, the Loggia dei Lanzi

10: the Piazza di Sante Croce 11: the Ponte Vecchio

12: Palazzo di Bargello

Not on the map, but on the small map to the right: the Piazzale Michelangelo: therefore, you should cross the Ponte San Niccolò, and via Lungarno B. Cellini you reach the Piazzale Michelangelo:



If you have time left, you can visit the other spots if you'd like to!

You first mission is **take a 'selfie**' of your group with the eyecatcher in the background. That way you can prove you have thoroughly investigated the place.

Be sure to have clear and decent pictures: they will be put on a blog so that everyone interested in our visit, can have a look at them.

On the different spots, you'll also recognize some of the pictures that are presented here on



this booklet: they depict details of the places you're visiting. You should tick off every picture you can find, and indicate on which spot you've found them.

An example: You'll surely recognize this picture as a detail of Florence's cathedral, the Duomo. So when in front of this Duomo, you take a selfie of the group with the cathedral as background, and you tick off this picture, meaning you've visited the Duomo. You also write the name of the eyecatcher next to it (in

this case: The Duomo).

But you should not only keep an eye on the pictures in this booklet: there's **also a list of names and concepts** you should take into account. Each of these names and concepts can be related to one eyecatcher, and should also be written underneath the corresponding picture.

An example: When standing in front of the Duomo, you'll definitely notice that the façade of this building is in gothic style, so the concept 'gothic architecture' can be written underneath it. You'll also learn from information boards that the dome of the Duomo is a masterpiece by Brunelleschi, so that name can be written underneath it too.

So, each picture corresponds with a name and a concept.

Now, the idea of the whole activity is that

- with one of the places on the map, none of the pictures correspond

- with one of the names in the list, none of the pictures correspond

- with one of the concepts in the list, none of the pictures correspond

And guess what: they are the place where and the perpetrator by whom this murder was committed, and the concept gives some more information about the murder!

We hope you enjoy your search!

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These are the **concepts**:

- jewellery
- a leather belt on the shoulder with his name on it
- 84 metres
- a door with 10 panels, each depicting a scene from the Old Testament
- fountain
- centre of square
- fire
- three peaks
- nine escutcheons of the city
- replica

These are the names:

- Saint John
- Giotto
- David and four allegorical statues representing day, night, dawn, twilight
- beheaded Medusa
- Bandinelli
- Arno
- Michelangelo
- Da Vinci
- Rex Regum et Dominus Dominantium: inscription by Cosimo
- Basilica
